What learning might I see happening here for Finlay?

'Relationship is ALL' is our mantra in the Pepe Room, Finlay, and you value and hold dear your relationships with others. I can see that through the connections you make with adults, you are secure to explore and connect with your peers. This has become more apparent over the last few weeks, and you have taken it all in your stride. It is around this age that you do begin to notice your peers, and your interactions with them move from playing alongside to playing together. Relationship is one of the principles of our curriculum too, understanding that learning comes when you are connected with people and places.

It is important here to let Finlay know what is going to happen, when it is necessary for me or other teachers to help out his friends, to offer him choices to pursue while we attend to his friends, and to allow him time to process this and make the choice that works for him. I have noticed when we do this, Finlay is happy to move off to what he has chosen to do.

How might we support Finlay further in this learning?

We will watch out for moments when Finlay is playing with his friends. We will continue to let him know what is going to happen and to allow him time to process and choose what he wants to do while tending to his friends.
