Teaching Team Reflection

It was exciting to see the children and parents so enthusiastic to join in this third adventure to our maunga. We often talk to our children about working as a team and this was evident as we could hear words of encouragement amongst the children and adults as they made their way around the maunga and then as they climbed to the top. We can see that the expansive learning environment at Bush Kindergarten is providing children with the skills to face challenges with a can do attitude and through this experience they are transferring their learning to the wider world.

Each trip to our maunga has provided us with new events and this trip was no different. We noticed the grass was a lot longer and that there was a lot of yellow flowers growing on the mountain, a true sign of Spring. Revisiting previous experiences is how we build on our knowledge and we noticed the children's kite flying skills had developed as they let out the string to allow their kites to fly higher. The children were at one with the wide open spaces, initiating their own games as they ran, played roly poly, and set their own goals.

Children see Puketapapa as a special place where they can take their families in the evenings or in the weekend, and as Lily explained to a visitor to our Kindergarten later that afternoon, "We visited our kindergarten mountain today." Powerful words.
